When I was asked to write a piece from the perspective of a junior tenant at KBW Chambers to mark its 70th Anniversary I of course felt honoured, but at the same time a little daunted at the prospect of trying to sum up what the set means to me in just a few words.

By 2020 my personal life had led me to live two hours away from Chambers. Many people in my life couldn't understand why despite there being many fantastic sets far closer to where I now live, the last thing on my mind was leaving KBW. This, I think, is a testament to how special the set is. I am under no illusion that the only reason that I have been able to stay a part of Chambers is because of the brilliant clerking team who have gone above and beyond to make it work, for which I could not be more grateful.
